

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## 2007 FLOOD: HOW MUCH WATER?

- 289,983 acre feet of measured water (12/03-08/2007).
- Equivalent to covering roadway between Chehalis and North of Kamloops with 1 foot of water or similarly covering . . .
  - 80% of Kitsap County.
  - 69% of Clark County.
  - 59% of Thurston County.




#### **RANKED HIGH-FLOW EVENTS:**

Five largest events since 1986 – Frequent floods are getting worse and damage is increasing . . .




# CHALLENGE: NEED FOR FISHERY ENHANCEMENT



#### 2013-15 STATE BUDGET

<b>1.</b> Design alternatives for large capital flood projects (basin-level water retention, local projects, and Interstate 5 protection).	\$9,200,000		
2. Construct priority local flood protection projects.	\$10,742,000		
3. Construct local multipurpose projects that reduce flood damage and benefit fish, create aquatic species enhancement plan.	\$4,350,000		
4. Enhance land use management and reduce damages to residential and other structures in the floodplain.	\$1,750,000		
5. State agency technical assistance, public process and project management.	\$2,160,000		
$TOTAL \rightarrow$	\$28,202,000

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
# **CURRENT PROJECTS UNDERWAY IN THE CHEHALIS BASIN**





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# **NEXT STEPS**



### GOVERNOR'S WORK GROUP PROCESS OVERVIEW

- July 2013- January 2014:
  - Determine alternatives for dam design and operation, I-5 and small projects scenario.
  - Guidance on aquatic species plan and benefit/cost methodology.
- February September 2014:
  - Finalize potential dam design/operation plan, and assessment of benefits and impacts.
  - Finalize species enhancement plan.
  - Assess local floodplain management.
  - Public Meetings.
  - Finalize all other technical analyses.
- September November 2014

Work Group develops recommendations to Governor and Legislature.
