East Fork Lewis River Partnership - Next Steps & Meeting Summary January 29, 2020, from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.

The first East Fork Lewis River
Partnership of 2020 was held on
January 29, 2020, in La Center,
Washington. Around forty partners,
representing twenty different
organizations attended the meeting.
Attendees included private landowners,
representatives from local, regional, and
state government, and non-profits.

The purpose of this meeting was to connect with partners and continue building relationships for clean water, while providing a platform for information sharing. The meeting included updates on ongoing projects and programs in the East Fork Lewis River, and discussion on next steps for clean water implementation in 2020.



The <u>agenda</u> included presentations from the Clark County Clean Water Division, Clark Public Utilities District, Lower Columbia Estuary Partnership, Clark County Parks and Lands, Watershed Alliance of Southwest Washington, City of La Center, Washington State University Extension, Clark Conservation District, and Washington State Department of Ecology. Next Steps

Nonpoint Implementation and Monitoring - Ecology's Nonpoint Source Water Quality
Specialists, Shawn Ultican and Jennifer Riedmayer, are working in the East Fork Lewis River
watershed. Shawn and Jennifer are focusing their proactive nonpoint source identification and
monitoring work in Brezee, Jenny, Bolen, and McCormick Creeks, and Rock Creek North. If you
are interested in conducting joint site visits and collaborating on nonpoint source outreach,

- Washington State University Extension WSU is planning to send around 1,000 mailers to East Fork Lewis River residents in 2020. These mailers will advertise Small Acreage Program workshops in 2020. There are Well and Septic Workshops and Agricultural BMP Workshops planned for the East Fork Lewis River this year.
- FY 2021 Funding The <u>Draft Water Quality Funding Offer List and Intended Use Plan</u> was published in January 2020. There were four projects submitted for funding in the East Fork Lewis River this year. Two of these projects were recommended for funding. The Columbian newspaper highlighted these projects in the article, *State to provide \$4M for six Clark County water projects*.
- FY 2022 Funding The next Water Quality Combined Funding Program cycle is expected to open in August 2020. Applications for FY 2022 Funding are due in October 2020. If you are interested in developing a project, reach out to Leanne Whitesell, Ecology's Southwest Regional Office Funding Coordinator or Devan Rostorfer to start the conversation. Tools and templates to support application development are available on the East Fork Lewis River Partnership webpage and on Ecology's general resources for water quality grants and loans webpage. The FY 2022 Funding Guidelines have not been published. Reference the FY 2021 Guidelines to get started.
- Clark County Watershed Website & New Signs Clark County recently launched a new
 "Explore your watershed" website for the public to learn about local water quality. New watershed
 signs also being implemented throughout Clark County's watersheds. Explore the website and
 look for new clean water signage coming to a watershed near you.
- Parking Lot From the meeting, there were only a few "parking lot" items for future discussion. Developing a survey for nonpoint source outreach was identified as one opportunity. There was additional discussion on best management practices for implementation of restoration projects on Clark County Legacy Lands, and ideas for invasive species management.
