CCA Bill Language and Background

CCA Bill Text- ESSB 5126, Section 47

RESIDENTIAL HEATING ASSISTANCE PROGRAM.

- (1) The legislature intends by this section to establish policies to mitigate the cost burden of the program established by this act on consumers who use home heating fuels that are not electricity or natural gas.
- (2) The department, in collaboration with interested stakeholders, shall develop a proposal for assisting households that, for residential home heating, use fuels that are not electricity or natural gas. The proposal must give priority to assisting low-income households through weatherization, conservation and efficiency services, and bill assistance.



Background- No Cost Allowances

Electricity

- Goal: mitigate cost burden
- Electric utilities may or may not have a compliance obligation
- No consignment requirement
- Revenue from consigned allowances must be used for the benefit of ratepayers



Background- No Cost Allowances

Natural Gas

- Goal: proactively assist low-income consumers
- A portion of no cost allowances must be consigned each year
 - 65 percent in 2023
 - Increasing over time to 100% in 20230
- Revenue from consigned no cost allowances must be used for the benefit of ratepayers



Low Income Home Energy Assistance (LIHEAP) – Community Services Division

- An Energy Assistance "safety net"
- Households with incomes at or below 150% of the federal poverty level
- Benefits paid directly to Utility Provider
- Keeping people warm in the winter and cool in the summer
- Assistance provided through 26 Community Action Agencies to cover heating bill, furnace repair or replacement, past due bills, temporary shelter and conservation education programs



(LIHEAP) through the Pandemic

• 2019 – Pre-Pandemic

- 67,209 Households Served
- 54,197 below 100% FPL
 - Family of Four \$2,091 a month
- Average Benefit of \$414
- 2020
 - 90,192 Households Served
 - 72,874 below 100% FPL
 - Family of Four \$2,145 a month
 - Average Benefit of \$439
- 2021
 - 109,985 Households Served
 - 97,048 below 100% FPL
 - Family of Four \$2,145 a month
 - Average Benefit of \$451





Agency Overview

The Washington State Pollution Liability Insurance Agency (PLIA) provides an effective and efficient government funding model that helps owners and operators meet financial responsibility and environmental cleanup requirements for underground storage tanks.

- Financial and technical assistance to petroleum underground storage tank (UST) owners/operators, typically gasoline/diesel (e.g., gas stations) and heating oil (e.g., residential heat source).
- Programs:
 - Reinsurance Program.
 - UST Loan and Grant Program.
 - Technical Assistance Program.
 - Financial Assurance verification.



Heating Oil Programs




- Heating Oil Tanks not regulated under state and federal mandates, but the release/contamination is regulated under Model Toxics Control Act, the state cleanup law.
- Tank owners are liable for heating oil releases and contamination.
- Authority for heating oil programs.
 - Chapter 70A.330 RCW Petroleum Storage Tank Systems Pollution Liability Protection Act.
 - Chapter 374-70 WAC Heating Oil Pollution Liability Insurance Program.
 - Chapter 374-80 WAC Advice and Technical Assistance Program.
 - Chapter 70A.345 RCW UST Revolving Loan and Grant Program.



Heating Oil Insurance Program

- Generally, homeowner's insurance does not cover pollution liability.
- Policy pays up to \$60,000 for cleanup related to heating oil tank release. No premium or deductible required.
- Registrations must be in place before July 2, 2020, per RCW 70A.330.040(1). Will accept transfer if property sale or inheritance.
- Program capped at \$15 million/per calendar year.
- Through September 2022:
 - 56,990 heating oil tank registrations.
 - Average of 263 claims filed per year.
 - PLIA has paid over \$101 million in heating oil cleanup.





Heating Oil Loan and Grant Program

- 2021 Program implementation with total \$4 million appropriated, approx. 52 sites.
- Total funding award: \$75,000 per tank system.
- Loan awards to pay for:
 - Cleanup of heating oil release.
 - Upgrade heating oil tank systems.
 - Install infrastructure.
- Fall 2022: Preliminary Planning Assessments performed for 2021 applicants.



Low-Interest Loan up to \$70,000 Interest rate: prime Term: 30 years No penalty for early payoff

Preliminary Planning Assessment Grant \$5,000 Performed by PLIA-contracted environmental consultants

Heating Oil Loan and Grant Program, cont'd.



- Application cycle Spring and Fall each year with slots allotted throughout state.
- Further consideration of historically marginalized, overburdened and underserved communities.
- Program administered through Guidance while rules are drafted.
- Potential partnership with other existing state programs, e.g., Commerce Weatherization Program.
 - Low-income households, historically marginalized, overburdened and underrepresented communities.
 - Environmental Justice (Health Disparities Map).



Technical Assistance Program

- Helps heating oil tanks owners meet the cleanup requirements of the state cleanup law.
- PLIA reviews submitted reports and issues an opinion letter based on the review. The types of opinions provided include:
 - **Approval:** The proposed work will meet the requirements of MTCA.
 - **Further Action**: More work is needed to meet the requirements of MTCA.
 - **No Further Action**: The cleanup meets the requirements of MTCA.
- Enrollment fee of \$1,300 per release/tank system. Fee is for PLIA cost recovery.


